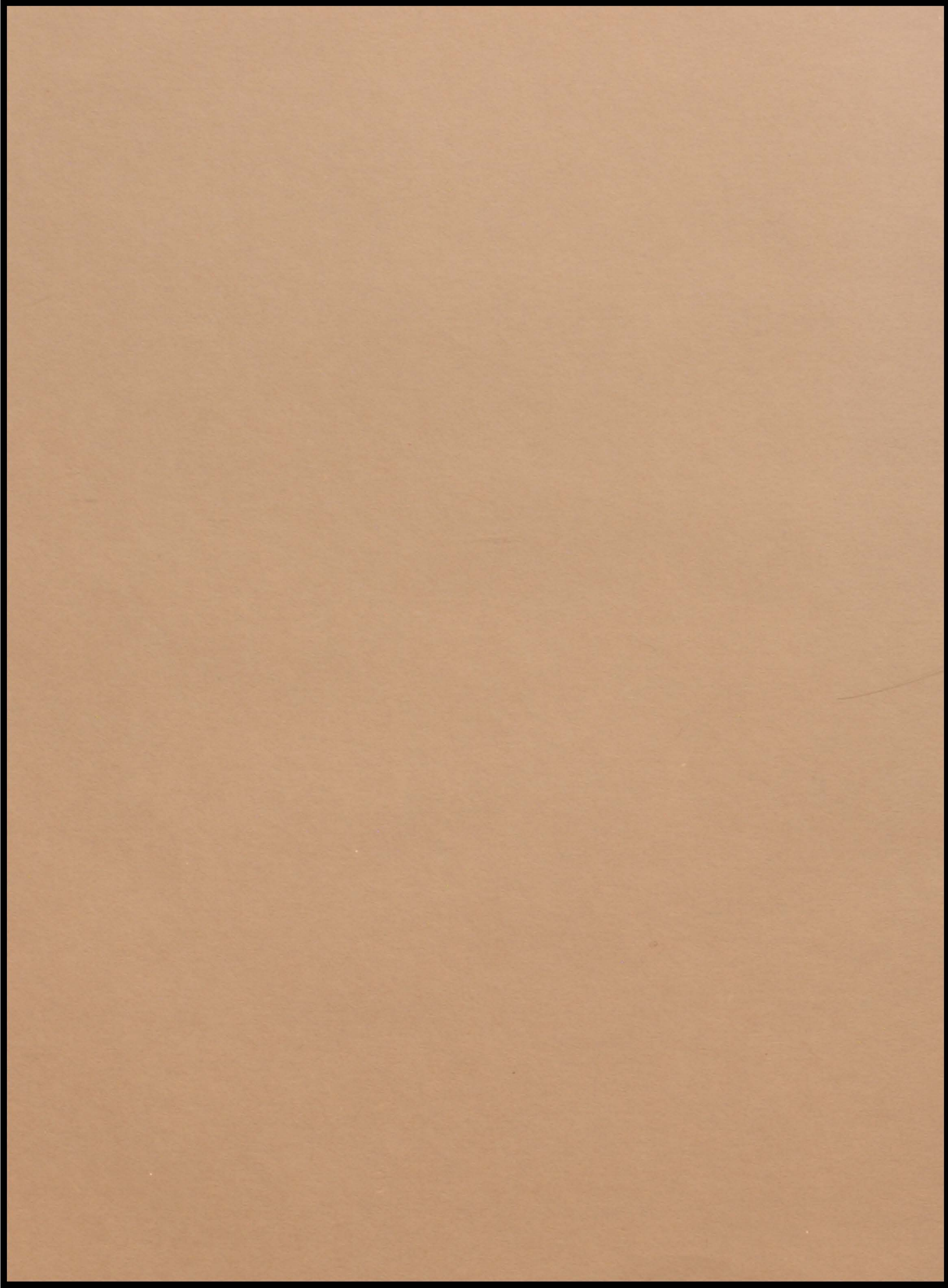

Augusta High School History From 1887-1987



In Use 1903 — 1919

We, the students from the graduating class of 1987, little realize the opportunities presented us in our modern building and up-to-date equipment.

If we stop to consider how in 1884 the first students of this institution were forced to work with inadequate equipment in a poorly lighted, ill-constructed little log building, we easily see that we have much to be thankful for.

Since then many changes have occurred, several buildings have been erected and the present one has been located as to present a combined campus at the outskirts of the city near the overhead and the industrial park.

When the A.H.S. was first organized in 1884, six teachers and a principal were employed. The present faculty includes twenty-four teachers, a principal and a superintendent.

In 1859, the first district school was established, and in 1887 a log school house was erected. After this building burned a wooden structure was completed which was used until 1903.

In 1887, there were five members in the graduation class; Clara Culy, Minnie Kyle, Lilla McCaffrey, Lois Sawyer, Winnie Kyle. This graduation was held on Monday evening, March 28. This was the first graduation in a four year high school, before that time they were considered graduates of a graded school.

The main building of the log school house was condemned and torn down, and in its place a brick edifice building was constructed in 1903, which remained the same until 1919, when it was again found to be too small and two new wings were added.

Most of our information was researched from the *Augusta Eagle* in conjunction with the journals of Lloyd B. Kolden. The information about principals and superintendents was very sketchy, but we do know that Albert Hedler was principal in 1900, and G. O. Banting was principal from 1901 to 1903. L. C. Hatch was principal in 1913.

One of the reasons for building this new school was that there were 94 young people in a room hardly large enough for half that number. So, in 1903, a new school was built. As a result of this new building, non-resident students could enroll. A new course of study was started dividing the year into two semesters. The subject matter included literature, history and science, medieval and modern history, chemistry, zoology, and commercial geography.

In 1912, high school students were concerned about drugs as thirty of the high school boys formed a league, the object of which was to eliminate the use of tobacco by school boys.

In 1919, the school begins serving hot lunches; as only one dish will be prepared, the students could bring any extra food from home.

In 1919, it was decided that the school was too small, and two new wings were added. Then in 1922, fire was discovered in the school house damaging the domestic science, music, and grade rooms in the main building. Some classes were held in the gymnasium. A meeting of all students and parents were held in the opera house to set up a program for rest of the school year. The building was repaired and much cleaning was needed. The repairs were needed because of heavy snows, accompanied by excessive melting had showed the poor condition of the roof. Plans were made to remove the excessive weight by raising the old roof and building a level type in its place.

In 1934, improvements continued on the school yard to provide a lawn. The interior of the school was also redecorated. All this work was completed with federal funds.

Augusta won the Class B basketball tournament for the first time in 1935. Members of the team were: Ralph Bush, Martin Gilbertson, Joe Howard, Dale Balliet, Phil McElory, Lloyd Zook, Butts Miller, Theil, Osborne, Johnson. Mr. Martzke was coach.

Music in the school was different from today. On May 13, 1937, a concert was held in the high school auditorium featuring primary grades, the High School Girls Glee Club, the boys music club, and the band. Mr. Frank Brendemuhl is the teacher of music.

A full-time agricultural course in the high school is now awaiting federal appropriation. The city council

also approved the purchase of the athletic field.

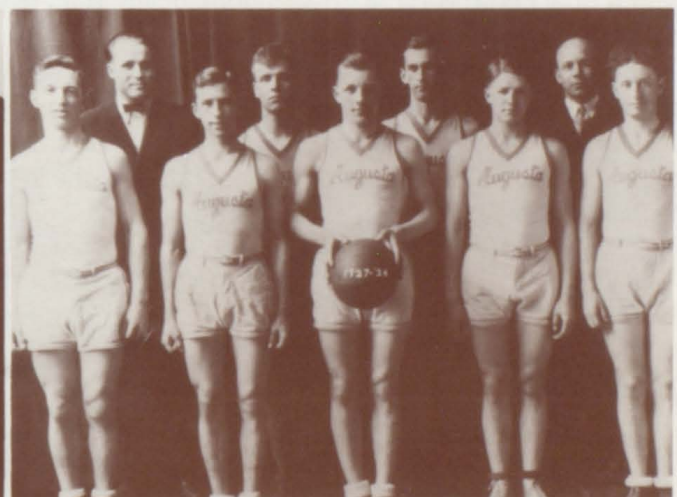
School busing started in 1937. A 36 passenger bus was purchased and a route was established. There was only 19 students listed on the route which was 36 miles long.

January, 1938, the first vocational classes in homemaking will be given this winter.

September of 1939, the athletic field was completed and dedicated during the homecoming events for that season. The band also showed off their new uniforms. The games opponent was Durand. The field was made possible by the WPA and was presented to the city. Lights on this field was suggested in the 1940 school year. During the year, funds were raised by a carnival, Fourth of July celebrations and other fund raisers and money was used to put lights on the field. The name of the field was changed to Memorial Field in 1946 in memory of those men who lost their lives in the service of their country.

It has taken until 1947 to finally get the lights paid for. During the half time of the Augusta-Arcadia football game, Memorial Field was re-dedicated. High School principal, Julian Bichler gave a brief address. All veterans were asked to be present and march out on the field to be recognized.

In 1941, A new school bus route to Ludington-Wilson was authorized for the Augusta Schools. Jay Balliett was the operator.



World War II had started and again many men from this area were in the war. Because of a shortage of manpower, parents of the school district voted 7-1 to have school on Saturday in order to have school closed earlier in May to get help on the farms.

November 26, 1942 — The admission charge to the band concert was a 25¢ war stamp.

December 9, 1943 — Last Monday evening, the Augusta High School "Bond" concert netted a total of \$255.85 in war bond stamps. Nine war bonds and \$87.00 in war stamps were purchased.

The high school participated in the war effort also, by charging admission to their concerts in the form of war bonds and stamps. The band has been voted a Music War Council distinguished service citation in recognition of its outstanding contribution to the war effort along with 500 other bands throughout the country. Other students collected milkweed pods as they contained a floss which is used for making life preservers for sailors.

April 26, 1945 — Sergeant Henry Radtke, son of Otto Radtke, Augusta has been killed in Battle of Germany, April 4th, Dorman Lighthizer who was reported missing in action Jan. 4 has been a prisoner of war in Germany.

The board of education in 1946 purchased the three school buses from Jay Balliet who has operated them since the transportation of students was started. The district will now operate them. At the time, the cost of riding the bus was \$5. per month for one child and two children will be \$8 per month. No extra charge will be made from any family.

Drivers Education classes were started in 1949 with a dual controlled car. The course included a 20-hour classroom and 8-20 hours of behind the wheel.

The Agriculture-industrial arts building will soon be completed. There was an addition of a gym-auditorium. Many fund raisers by a number of civic organizations helped finance the decorating of the interior of the building, such as the stage curtains.

Consolidation of the rural-city school started in the summer of 1958, when a joining was suggested to join Joint District One consisting of the city parts of Bridge Creek and Otter Creek and School District One consisting of the Dells, Kirkham Valley and Troubled Waters districts. On July 1, 1962 Thompson Valley and Scott's Valley will be joining followed by Russells corner.

Some traditions still go on — the FFA polio drive was held in January of 1961 when almost \$500 was raised. Mr. Donald Hemstock was the advisor.

Plans for a new elementary school will be shown at the annual school meeting in 1962. The Russel Corners rural school observed its 100th anniversary. School reopened after Christmas Vacation in 1963 in a brand new school. A formal dedication was held after a years use, the speakers were Pastor Richard Schroeder of St. Pauls Luthern Church, Mr. Lester Lowman, Richard Johnson, past and present board members, Mrs. Frances Pierce, 3rd grade teacher, Elroy Melberg, PTA President — Rhonda Erdman and Mike Kunz, 6th grade pupils and William Kean, Superintendent. In September, 1964, the new highpowered lights at Memorial Field were pronounced an outstanding success at the first full game.

During the spring of 1971 a vocational education building was planned to house four shop areas and two classrooms to be located at the site of the new elementary school. The proposal was accepted. Present board members were Richard Johnson, Dr. Bruce Karolus, Arnold Sudbrink, Galen Smith, and Martin Thode.

In 1971, a 40 by 70 ft. addition was added to the elementary school.

The building housing the high school has been in use since 1903 with many remodeling projects and addition. The building was getting a little shaky. Some of the bricks were falling so it was decided to investigate the building of a new building. The vote was taken at the annual meeting in 1974. The referendum was defeated in Nov. 7, 1974; but the Industrial Commission inspected the building and found the weight of the books in the library were too heavy for the foundation so one day during school the library was moved from the second floor to the ground floor. Many ideas were discussed such as renovating the old building, but costs were prohibited and finally on July 17, 1975 a vote in favor of a new building next to the New Vocational building was passed. A swimming pool and auditorium were rejected.

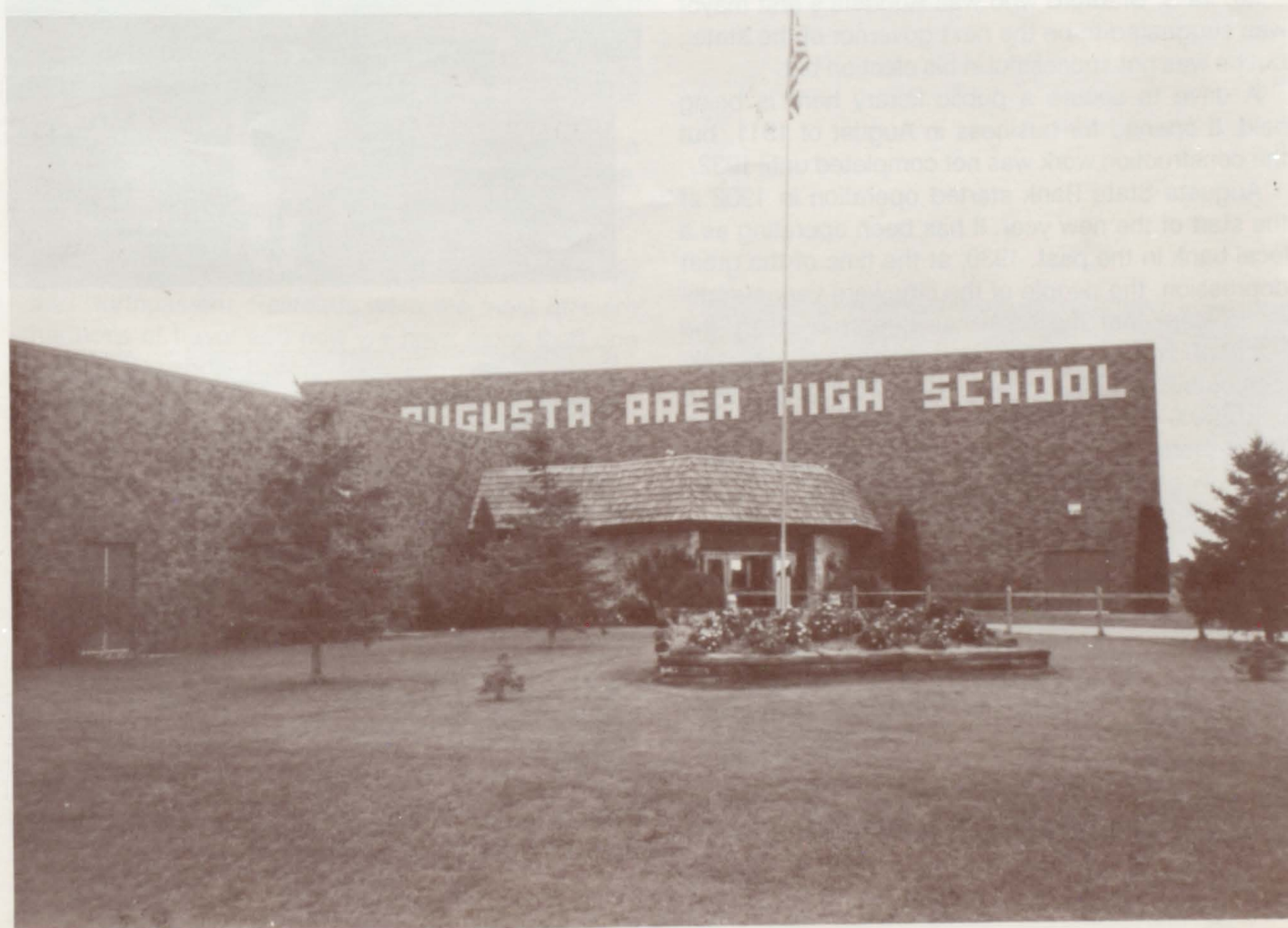
Ground breaking ceremonies were held in October, 1975 for the new building. Taking part were Marlene Hanson, elementary, principal, Tom Henning, High School Principal, James Larson, Superintendent and board members, Galen Smith, George Stanek, Gwen Lee and Martin Thode.

The beaver, our giant fiberglass mascot, was placed over the front entrance of the New School. It was paid for by the school activities, including help from the sixth grade.

February was the magic time. We moved into the New School. Problems occurred though the new bleachers were damaged on arrival and had to be replaced.

Since that time, Augusta schools have operated the district located at the west edge of town near the Highway 12 overhead. We have had many successful years in our sports adding many girls teams to create an equality between sexes. Our educational programs are continuing as always on a very high level.

The old high school has been leased to the city, the condemned section has been torn down, the gym and old classrooms have been turned into a senior citizen center.



HISTORY OF CITY AND AREA

During the time the school was conducting day by day activities, the city of Augusta and the world around us was also enjoying some good progress.

The *Augusta Eagle* dated July 11, 1884 was published for the first time. Much of the history of Augusta and surrounding areas as well as the school history would not be known today if this event had not occurred. Griff O. Jones, publisher of the *Eagle* for over 25 years, sold the paper to D.S. Benidict, followed by Mr. Wilson and Mr. Masters, Frank Clark, and E. G. Herrell. The name was changed to the *Times* at about 1914. The paper was in the Herrell family until 1974 when it was sold to Mr. and Mrs. Mike Jenson of Osseo. About this time some significant event also happened.

The Geneva Convention was signed; this is the international agreement for the care of war wounded. It is still in effect today.

1880, Edison patented the incandescent light. In 1888, Eastman perfects the hand camera.

In 1886, American Federation of Labor formed. The Weather Bureau was organized in 1890. The first gasoline and electric-powered autos were marketed in 1892.

Basketball was invented in 1891. Where would we be today without this game? Wright Brothers made their first flight in 1903.

Mr. Ira B. Bradford who was Augusta's first mayor was suggested to be the next governor of the state., but he was not successful in his election bid.

A drive to secure a public library here is being held. It opened for business in August of 1911, but the construction work was not completed until 1932.

Augusta State Bank started operation in 1902 at the start of the new year. It has been operating as a local bank in the past. 1930, at the time of the great depression, the people of the city were very surprised to learn that the bank has been closed by the board of directors and was in the hands of the banking commission. The report was that depositors were paid 100%. The bank first started in 1875.

The Rodell area at one time was called Rosedale. The new store, built there, was one of the best constructed buildings in the area. People were interested in progress and the telephone exchange was continually being improved. New cement walks were being laid in front of residences as money became available. The Omaha railroad depot was an important addition to Augusta. Roads between different communities such as Fairchild were built to

help mail delivery. Augusta had one of the newest waterworks in the area and it is still in operation today.





There were many fires, but the fire department did a good job of keeping the fires from spreading. In 1908, a new fire alarm was installed and a penalty was provided for turning in a false alarm. A new railroad company is installing track just south of town, the Foster and Northeastern. Railroads were the most efficient methods of travel and now we have more than one company to choose from.

Roller skating has become a very popular pastime. There is a rink at the Augusta Opera House. Movies were shown also. In 1932, the opera house is being equipped for talking pictures. The New Grand Theater was also in Augusta. It is owned by Messrs, Scott and Osborn, both familiar names in this area.

In 1921, World War I was over, and a big homecoming was held in Eau Claire as a tribute to the 59 men

from the area listed as killed or missing; at least 7 of them were from our area.

The Panama Canal was completed in 1915, cutting a lot of miles off the trip between the two oceans. The Boy Scouts of America were founded in 1910. World wide flu epidemic kills 20 million people during 1918 and 19. First Mickey Mouse cartoon was shown in 1928. These events were also part of the history of the Augusta area, and many things were influenced by them.

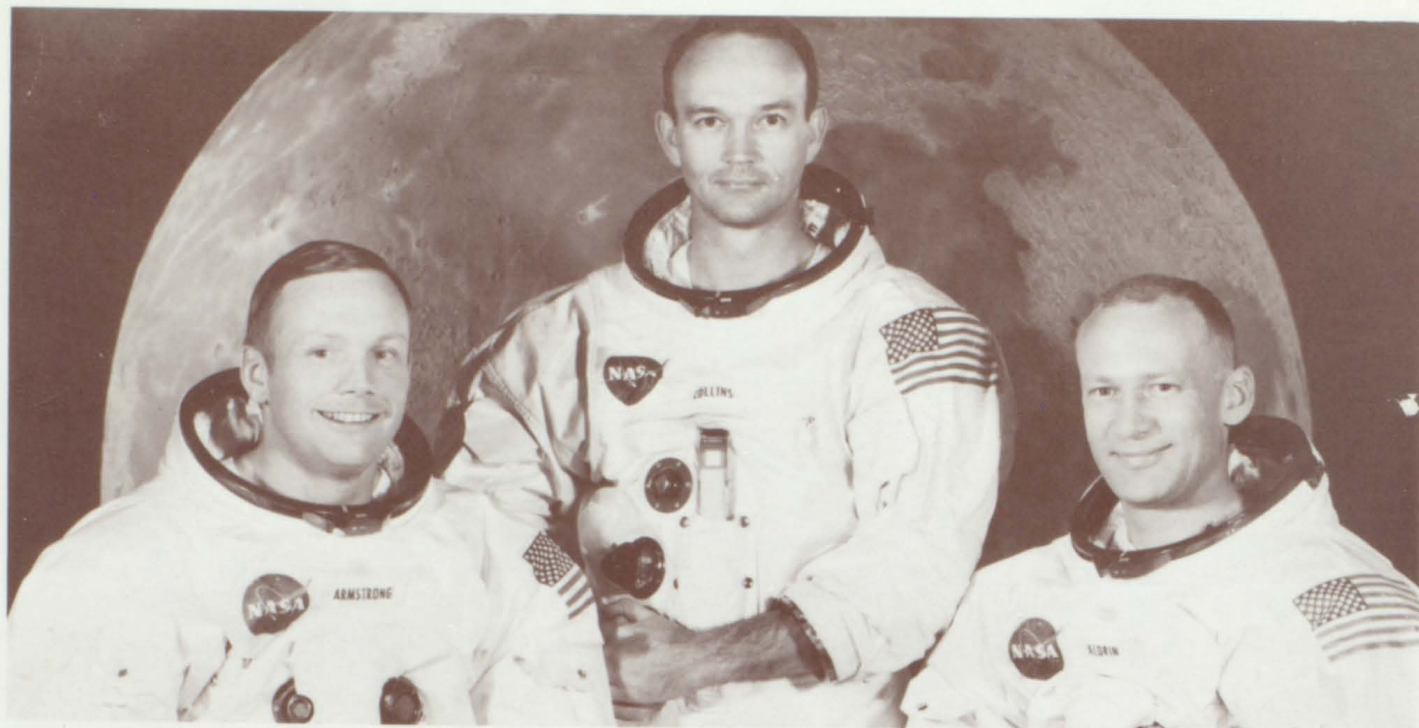
The start of the great depression caused a big change in the economics of the rural area of Augusta as well as the economics of Wall Street. This was the time when the banks closed.

November 29, 1939, a Chapter of Lions International Clubs was organized with 16 members signing the charter. This was the start of the Lions as we know them, and we wish to thank them for all the things they have done for the school and students through the years.

World War I started in Europe in 1914. U.S. enters the war in 1917. The armistice was signed November 11, 1918.

By this time, the World War II had started and the United States entered the war with the bombing of Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941.





FIRST MEN ON THE MOON

One of the more famous people in the area is Philo (Pinky) Englesby who was appointed as Augusta Chief of Police in 1955 for a period of one year. This year lasted until he retired in 1977.

The city of Augusta declared its centennial proclamation in 1956. Centennial fever has hit town. Many celebrations are being held, booklets are on sale, telegrams are coming in from everywhere, and the members of the community are really proud of this grand city in which to live.

The World War II was called the war to end all wars, but in 1950 our government again entered into a conflict with Korea. The USSR launches Sputnik in 1957 starting the space flight contest. Alaska and Hawaii become states in 1959.

In May of 1969, Apollo II lands the first man on the moon. Since that time the United States has continued with the space program, until an accident occurred in 1986 with a civilian teacher on board. Since then progress has been slow, but it will be continued.

Dedication of the Freedom Shrine at the Augusta High School set a new note of reverence to this type of occasion. This was in April, 1973. The Shrine exhibits many of the basic documents of the American way and has been installed in all states by the Exchange clubs honoring the nations current veterans, especially of the Vietnam military action, which started in 1964 and lasted until 1974. The Sunrise Exchange Club of Eau Claire presented this Shrine to the school in memory of three men who died in the Vietnam action; Dale Erdman, Rodney Lawson, and

Daniel Westlie. A poem by Mrs. Alvin O. Erdman, mother of Dale Erdman, was recited by James Larson, Superintendent of schools during the presentation.

So many things have happened in the lives of everyone who attended Augusta High School that it is impossible for us to print it all here. These recollections simply are the start of recalling the many happy and sad times we have all had.

Fashion History 1887-1987

In the last one-hundred years, clothing styles have continually changed. In 1887, the women of Augusta and other rural towns probably didn't dress at the height of fashion, but its basic design and influence could be seen in their more practical styles. A lady's outfit of the 1880's would be as follows:

steel-reinforced corset	20 lbs.
corset cover	4 lbs.
wire bustle (which extended the dress nearly a foot in back)	2 lbs.
four petticoats	20 lbs.
flannel drawers	2 lbs.
hose	2 lbs.
shoes	8 lbs.
shirtwaist	22 lbs.
skirt	35 lbs.
coat	15 lbs.
hat	10 lbs.
parasol	4 lbs.
reticule	3 lbs.
total	<u>147 lbs.</u>

Since then women's clothing has changed towards more practical and comfortable styles. Each era can be identified with certain styles:

1890's — huge balloon sleeves, gored bell-shaped skirts

turn of the century — "S" shape figure

WWI — shorter skirts gave women new freedom

1920's — flapper look, dropped waist-line and boyish figure

1930's — hemlines fall with the stock-market

1940's/WWII — padded shoulders, government war regulations restrict styles to short narrow skirts

1950's — Dior's "new look", long circle skirts

1960's — mini-skirts, pillbox hats

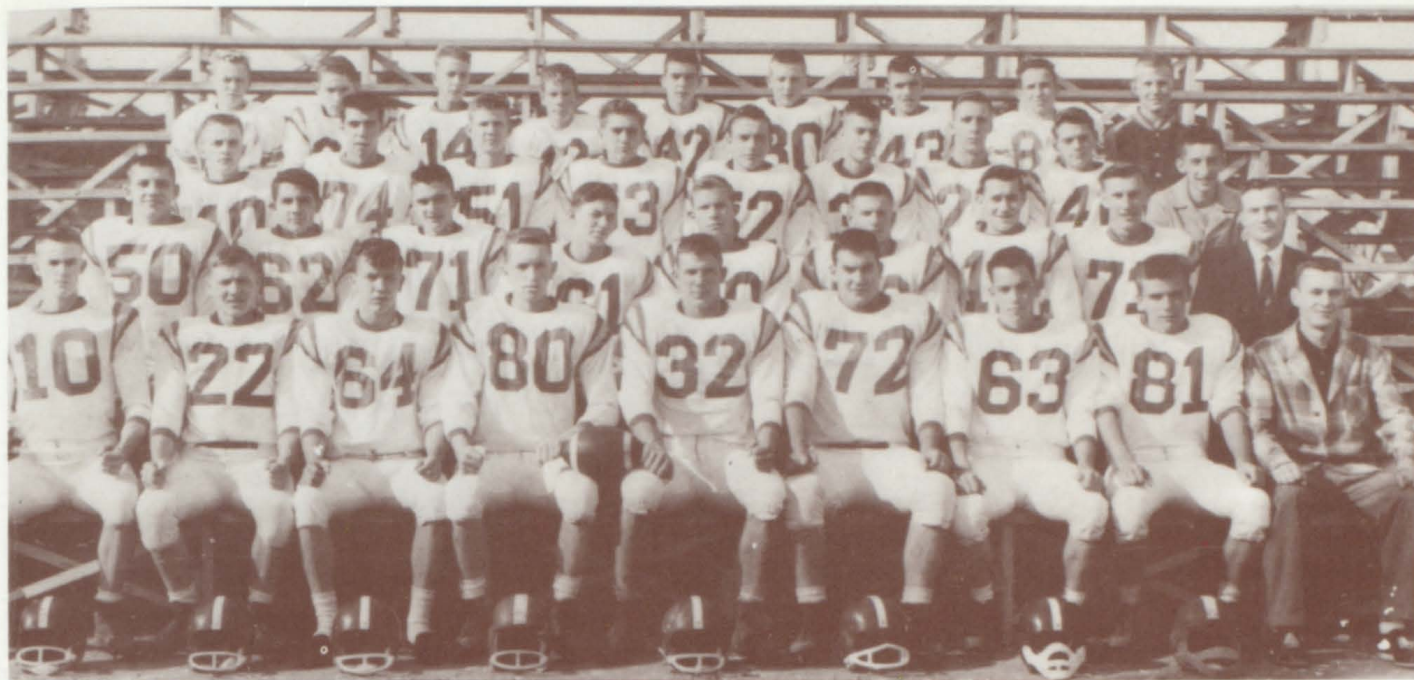
1970's — slacks become acceptable for day-wear, pantsuits

1980's — return of many former styles, individuality is in.

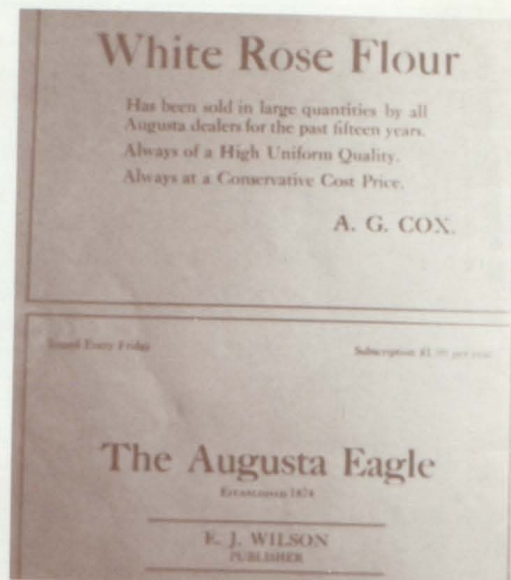

Of the years in the past.


Tears fill our eyes

The class of 1987 proudly dedicates the centennial edition of the Beaver to the class of 1887, the first class to graduate from the Augusta High School. This class consisted of five girls, Minnie and Winnie Kyle, Lois Sawyer, Clara Culy, and Lilla McCaffrey.

These five girls were the forerunners of today's educational system. Before this time, children finished the eight elementary grades and were needed at home to help earn a living, so further education was not necessary.

Minnie, Winnie, Lois, Clara, and Lilla, chose as their motto "More Beyond." We believe they felt that now they were graduated, they could go beyond the Augusta area and bring a better life to young children as they probably were trained to be teachers; we know one of them did move to Alma Center and taught there.

Augusta led this area in education as students from other parts of the area roamed with people in Augusta and attended our school as nonresidents.

From 1887 to the present time, Augusta High School has offered a quality education to all who wanted to work for one. Graduates from here have followed their dreams to become doctors, lawyers, teachers, nurses, policemen, entrepreneurs, and parents.

The graduates of Augusta are also good citizens acting as school board members, church members, PTA officers, civic organization members, members of congress and many other service directed people.

We, the class of 1987, wish to honor the graduating classes down through history by our accomplishment to bring honor and glory to AHS.

Since the fall of 1965, Mrs. Juanita Buchholz has been the Business Education Instructor here at Augusta High School.

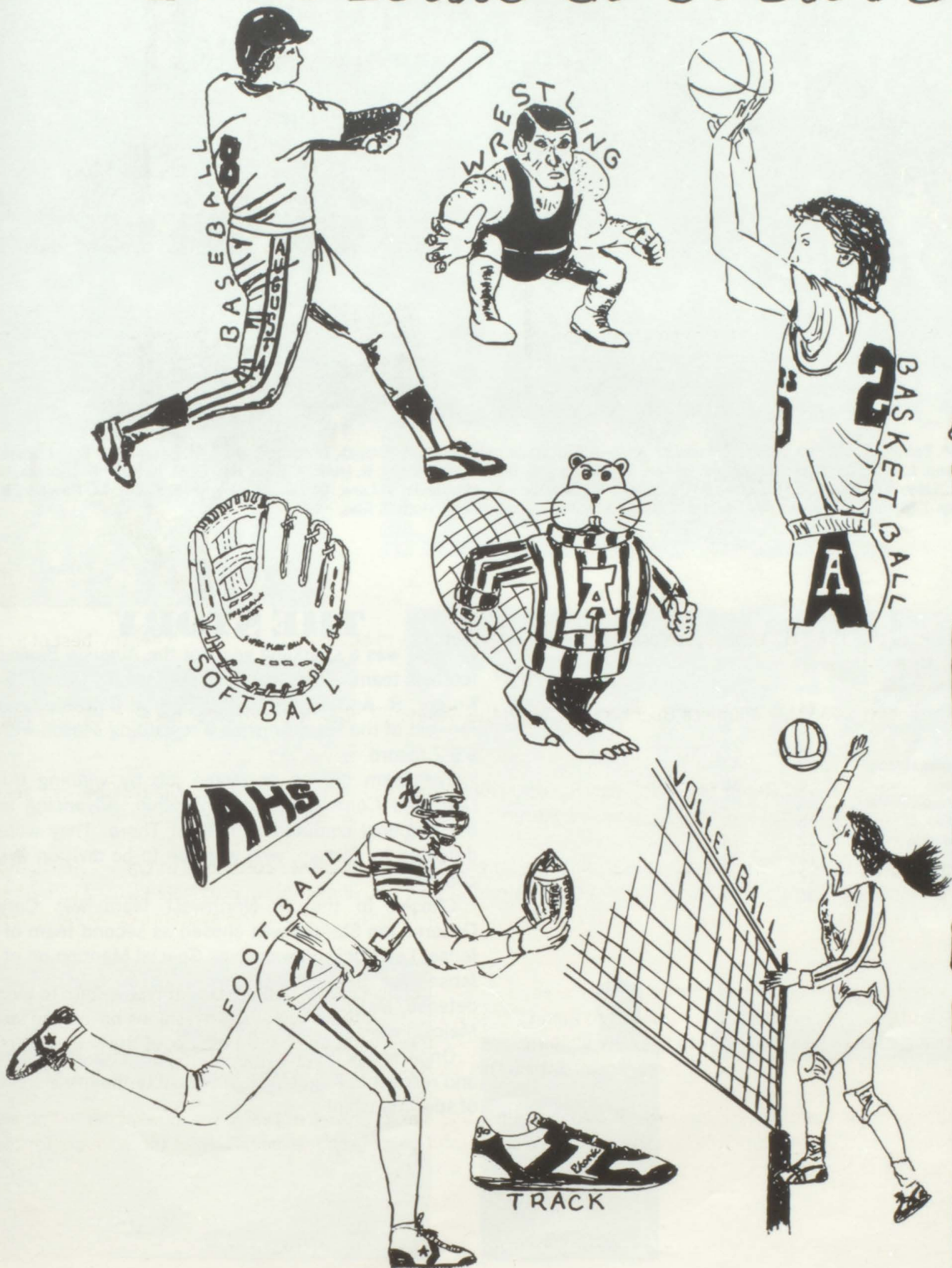

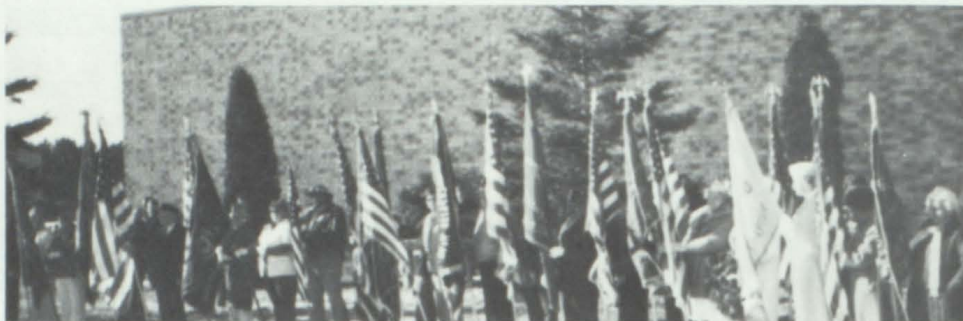

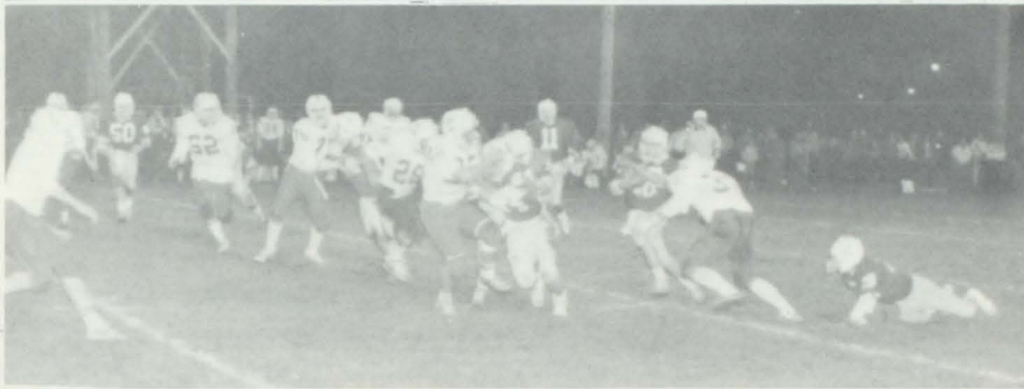
SPECIAL EVENTS AT AHS

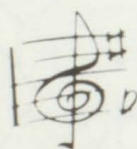

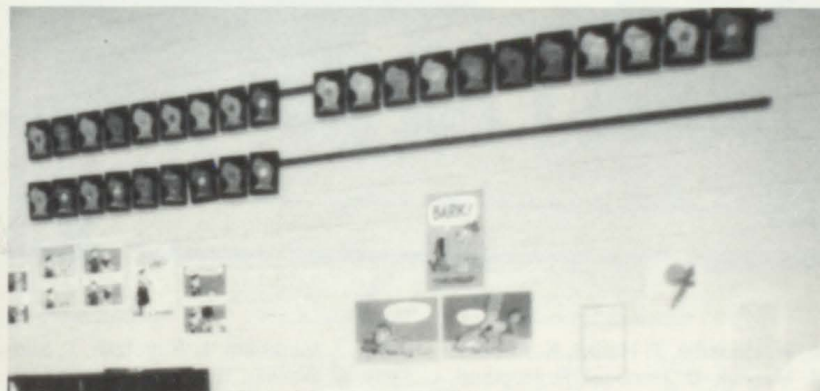

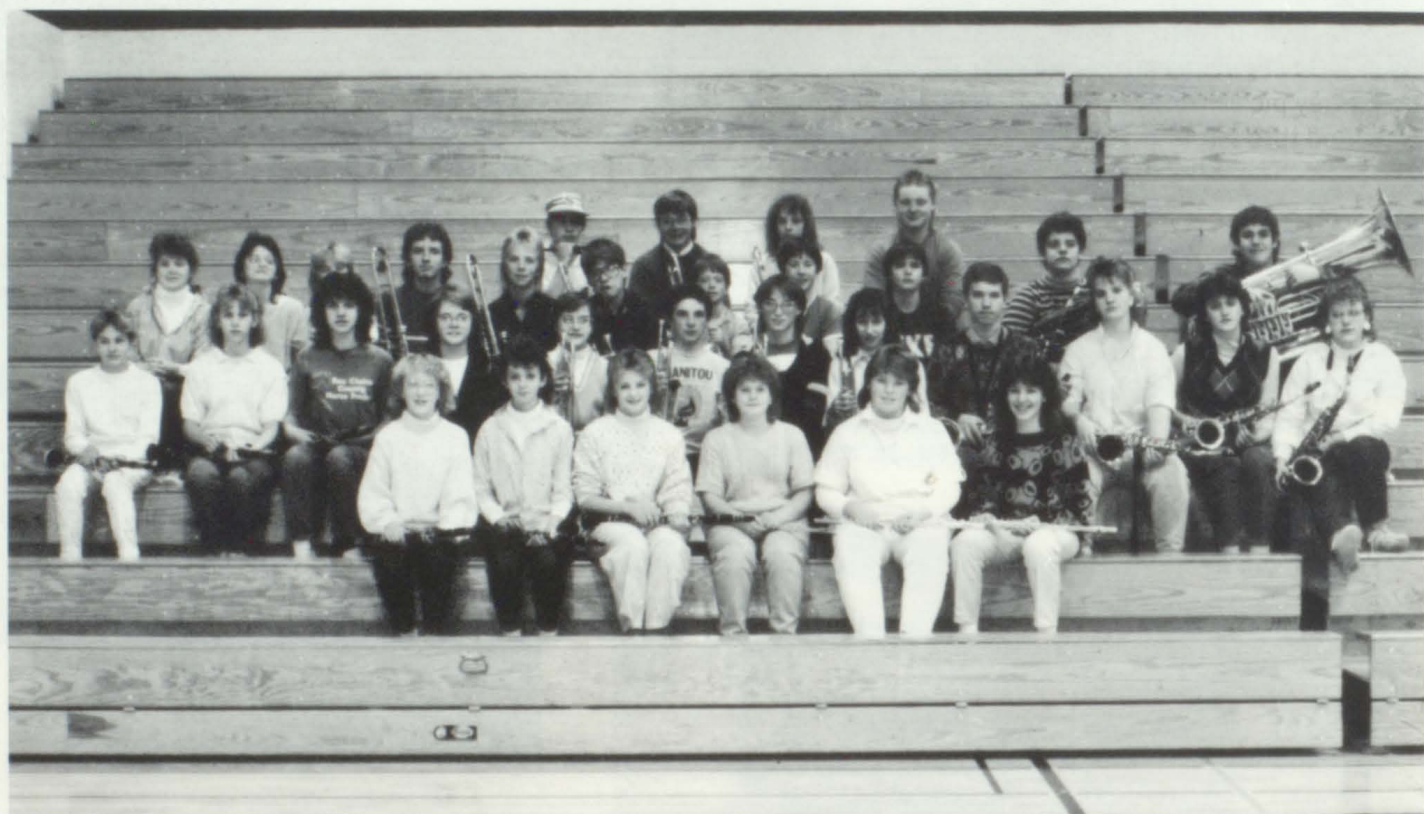

Had never gone away.

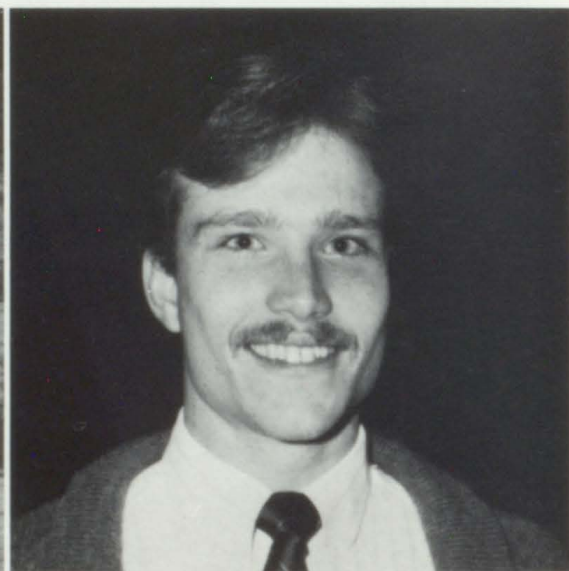
