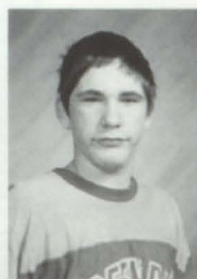
UNDERCLASSMEN

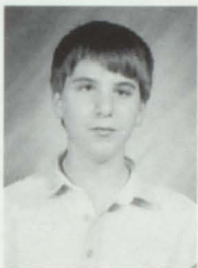

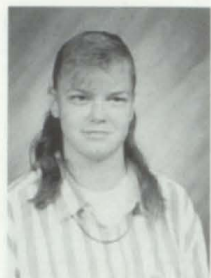
THE BOOMBASTICS

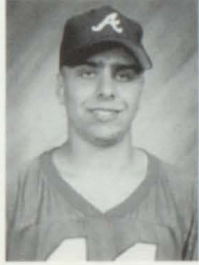

Attitude Adjustment Time

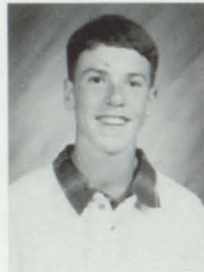

Girls Prove Too Hot To Handle

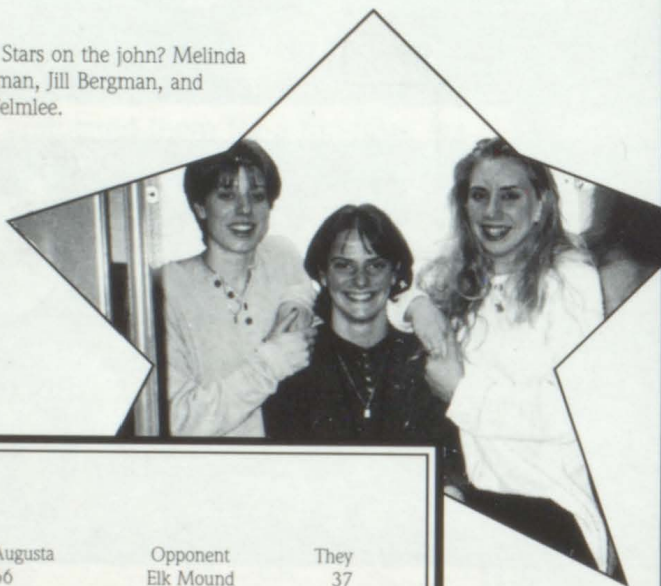

As for the dance, whether the people spent it burning leather or shooting hoops, the memories of 1995 homecoming drifted away into the depths of Heaven.

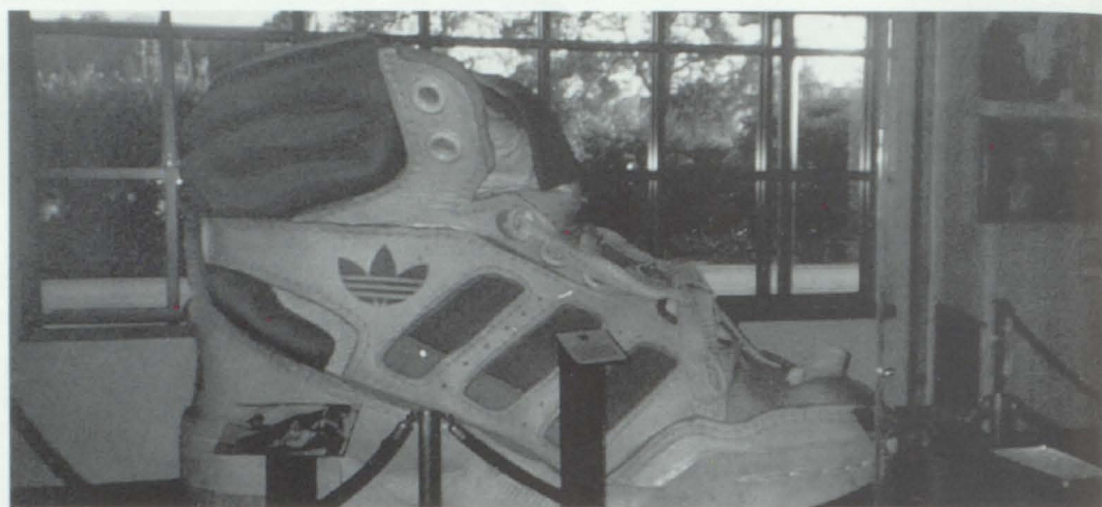


JOURNEY INTO THE UNKNOWN

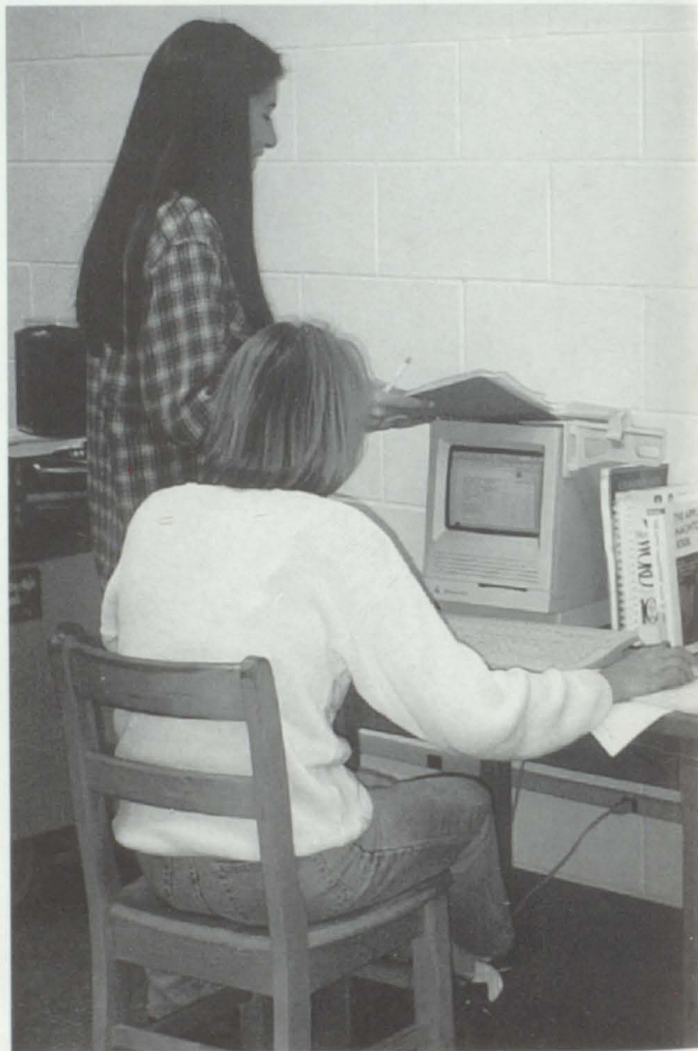
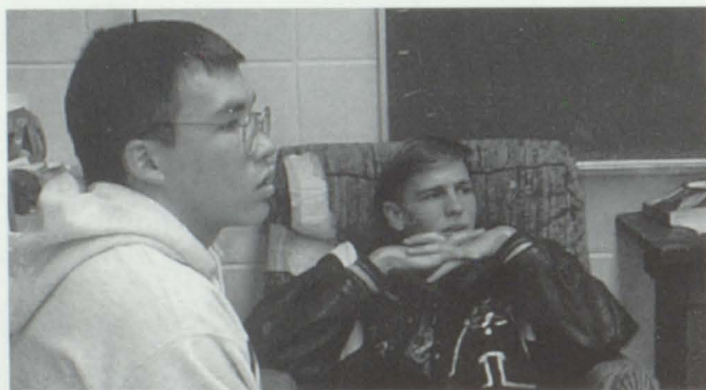

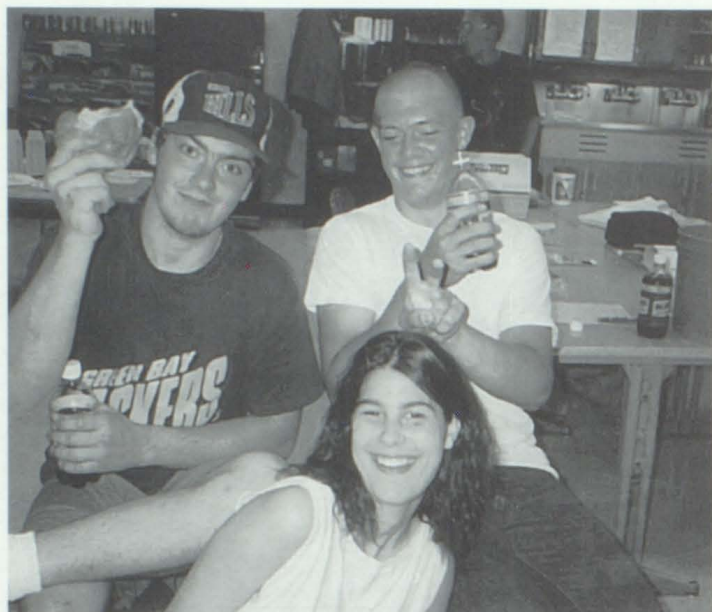
FEINGOLD AND FINESCHOLARS
